COURSE DESCRIPTION

Management Foundations is designed to be a broad-based introductory course that focuses on management functions and the application of management principles.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

- Become familiar with fundamental theories of management and management techniques.
- Understand both macro- and micro-aspects of management practice.
- Develop ways to leverage the newly acquired management knowledge to improve professional interaction in your current and future work settings.

PREREQUISITES

A junior level standing is required for enrollment in this course. If you do not meet this requirement, please make sure that you have an approval from your academic advisor/s before continuing. A waiver may be required.

MODE OF INSTRUCTION

The primary mode of instruction will be lecture accompanied by class discussion and experiential exercises in addition to reading assignments.

CLASS ATTENDANCE & PARTICIPATION

Attendance is not mandatory. Students should, however, be aware that they are responsible for all material presented during lecture, class discussions/exercises, and in assigned readings. As such, students are strongly encouraged to attend all classes and make a concerted effort to grasp the material presented.

Participation is not mandatory. However, engaging in class discussions and exercises can greatly enhance students' learning of management concepts. As such, students are strongly encouraged to actively participate as much as possible.

COURSE EVALUATION & GRADING

EXAMS

Exams are in-class during scheduled class time and closed-everything. Students will need to have an unused blue scantron, student ID number, and a #2 pencil with them on exam days.

Exam I & Exam II will consist of 40 multiple choice & true/false questions worth ½ point each. Exam questions will be taken from lecture, assigned readings, and class discussions/exercises. Students will be given 50 minutes to complete the exam.

The **Final Exam** (optional) is comprehensive and will consist of 90 multiple choice & true/false questions worth ½ point each. Exam questions will be taken from lecture, assigned readings, and class discussions/exercises. Students will be given 150 minutes to complete the exam.

- If a student elects to take the Final Exam and has **TAKEN BOTH** Exam I and Exam II, then the score achieved on the Final Exam will count **ONLY** for the Final Exam.
- If a student elects to take the Final Exam and has **MISSED AN EXAM** (with no make-up), then the Final Exam score will count for the Final Exam **AND** one missed exam.
- If a student elects to forego the Final Exam and has **TAKEN BOTH** Exam I and Exam II, then the **AVERAGE OF** Exams I and II will be used to determine the Final Exam score. For example, if Exam I score = 76% and Exam II score = 82% then the Final Exam score = 79%.
- If a student elects to forego the Final Exam and has **MISSED AN EXAM** (with no make-up), then a score of zero will be assigned for the Final Exam **AND** will remain so for the missed exam.

Missed Exams & Make-up Exams:

Any student that misses an exam without giving the instructor **PRIOR** notification and fails to provide documentation of a valid Tiger Cub excuse will receive a score of zero for the missed exam. Make-up exams will only be permitted for students with documentation of a valid Tiger Cub excuse **AND** have either notified the instructor in advance of the absence **OR** have documented evidence of an emergency that prevented the student from notifying the instructor in advance of the absence. No exceptions will be made to this policy under any circumstances. In the event that a make-up exam is permitted, the instructor reserves the right to administer a different exam than that which was taken by other members of the class.

Except in extreme circumstances, make-up exams must be taken during regular campus hours (7:45 a.m. – 4:45 p.m.) within 5 weekdays of the missed exam. If the make-up exam has not been taken within 5 weekdays of the missed exam, the student will receive a score of zero for the exam.

“REFLECTIONS ON MANAGEMENT” ESSAY PROJECT (Due by 5:00 p.m., Friday, December 5)

As a part of your overall grade, you are required to submit a 2 – 3 page (double-spaced) reflective essay regarding fundamental management theory and practice. The essay will serve as a mechanism to explore your own thoughts and opinions regarding management principles touched upon throughout the course. Further details will be provided later in the semester.
